**Remember these facts**

- Every **singular noun** needs a determiner.
- POSSESSIVES** can go with **any noun**.
- Proper names (Caesar Cardini)** **do not** need a determiner.
- Some determiners go with **singular nouns**, like *pen*.
- Some determiners go with **uncountable nouns**, like *rice*.
- Some determiners go with **plural nouns**, like *pens*.
