Lesson 7: Yes/No questions

In lesson 1, we said that X-Words were important for five reasons

- 1) they are used to ask questions,
- 2) they are used to make negative statements
- 3) they are used to find the subject of a sentence
- 4) they are used to change tense
- 5) they are used to add meaning

Let's look at number 1.

You have learned that some sentences have X-Words and some (V/XO, V/XS, V/XD) do not. In this lesson you will learn how to make **yes/no questions** in sentences that have an X-Word.

Do you remember how to find the **subject** of a sentence? Just find the **X**. Everything between the beginning of the sentence and the X is the **subject**. To make a **yes/no question**, actually move the X-Word to the beginning of the sentence.



X Jenny and Sam are getting married.

Rule: to make a yes/no question in a sentence with an X-Word,

- 1) move the X-Word to the front of the sentence and
- 2) change the period to a question mark.

The X-Word at the beginning of an English question tells us that a question is coming.
